## Call to Worship - New City Catechism Question \#1

Good morning and welcome to Antioch Church! It's good to be back in the building, though I wish we could all be here together! Prior to Covid-19 we were using the New City Catechism in our liturgy because of how it coincides with the truths of Ephesians (and also to encourage you to use it in your homes). The first question reads,

What is our only hope in life and death?
Let's say the answer together as our call to worship:
Congregation: That we are not our own but belong, body and soul, both in life and death, to God and to our Savior Jesus Christ.
There is a new hymn that has been written based on this question, and today we would like to sing it for the first time as a church. Let's sing!

## Christ Our Hope In Life And Death

## Confession - Luke 18:13

In the past few weeks there has been turmoil all around us, especially regarding the topics of reopening and race. Not just in Georgia, but also here in our own city. Even though we don't have all the details regarding these situations, it is still right for us to grieve the violence and loss, and to cry out to God for his perfect justice.

Likewise, as family, friends, neighbors, and even Christians have been divided over reopening, it's right for us to lament the animosity and confusion, and cry out to God for his perfect peace. So let us pray this together, and repeat with me the refrain from the early church, "Lord, have mercy."

God the Father, for the lives lost, the injustices overlooked, and the racism perpetrated and incited,
Congregation: Lord, have mercy.
God the Son, for the fears multiplied, the apathy of neighbor, and the reopening tensions stoked,
Congregation: Lord, have mercy.
God the Spirit, for the ways we have contributed in our clamor or our silence, search our hearts.
Congregation: Lord, have mercy. (based on Luke 18:13)

We begin each gathering with a call to worship and end with a benediction, which is simply a reminder that we are blessed to be a blessing:

Church, no human being on earth has yet tamed the tongue; for we are a people of unclean lips. And yet Jesus Christ has touched your lips-your guilt is taken away, and your sin is atoned for. Therefore from the overflow of your new heart, may your mouth bless, that you may obtain a blessing, and be a blessing. (based on James 3:7-12; Isaiah 6:1-7; Matthew 12:33-37; 1 Peter 3:8-9)

The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.
Congregation: We are sent.
